LIVERPOOL BIENNIAL TODAY OPENS NINE EXHIBITIONS PRESENTING THE COMPLETE 11TH EDITION: *THE STOMACH AND THE PORT*

On Wednesday 19 May, Liverpool Biennial opens nine new exhibitions, bringing together the complete presentation of the 11th edition, *The Stomach and the Port,* which runs until 27 June. This final chapter complements the outdoor sculptures, installations, sonic and digital commissions, and online event programme on the <u>Biennial Online Portal</u>, which launched in March. Now, in line with Government guidance, the Biennial is opening more doors to Liverpool, welcoming visitors to safely enjoy the UK's largest free festival of contemporary art.

The Stomach and the Port is curated by Manuela Moscoso and showcases the work of 50 leading and emerging artists and collectives from 30 countries around the world, including 47 new commissions for the Liverpool Biennial.

Exploring concepts of the body, the Biennial draws on non-Western thinking that challenges our understanding of the individual as a defined, self-sufficient, entity. Instead, the body is seen as fluid, being continuously shaped by, and actively shaping its environment. At the heart of this Biennial is Liverpool's history as a port city, an active agent in the process of modernisation, change, and colonialism. Through the visible and invisible dynamics of the port's past, this Biennial envisions different forms of being human and explores what bodies have the potential to be.

Presented across the city, in new and historic locations, the Biennial has taken over the Lewis's Building, Dr Martin Luther King Jr Building, the Lush Building, Liverpool Central Library and Cotton Exchange to install site-specific exhibitions, while new exhibitions have been created with the city's leading art venues, Tate Liverpool, FACT, Bluecoat and Open Eye Gallery.

The Biennial's series of outdoor sculptures and installations by seven artists celebrate Liverpool's iconic architecture and public spaces. Connecting bodies and experiences to key places, past and present, together they speak of the movement of humans across the sea and propose new understandings of the relationships between the body and nature.

To navigate the breadth of the Biennial and to make connections between the artworks, a free Guide is available to pick up around the city and <u>online</u>, and a series of suggested <u>trails</u> gather exhibitions, outdoor sculptures and installations around 3 curatorial entry points – Stomach, Porosity and Kinship.

Underpinning the physical festival is the <u>Biennial Online Portal</u>, a platform presenting an introduction to each of the artists and entry points, along with a dynamic digital programme *Processes of Fermentation*. This combines an inspiring line-up of live performances, artist interviews, curatorial videos, artist-led discussions and workshops, a film programme and podcasts, providing ever-changing, rich and engaging multimedia content. In addition, a vibrant selection of online and physical resources is available for children and young people, bringing the Biennial into the home, the classroom and the community.

To coincide with the launch of the exhibitions, the Biennial is releasing work for sale by Liverpool Biennial 2021 artists: a special edition vinyl by Neo Muyanga, produced in collaboration with SAVVY Contemporary and a limited-edition print by Teresa Solar, alongside a trio of prints by Dr. Lakra. Also available at <u>www.biennial.com/shop</u> is *The Stomach and the Port* book, featuring essays by selected artists and written narratives by Manuela Moscoso and Keyna Eleison, Co-Director of Museum of Modern Art, Rio de Janeiro. Proceeds from every sale support future programming with artists and communities.

Dr. Samantha Lackey, Director, Liverpool Biennial, said: "This Biennial's creative vision, developed by Manuela Moscoso with our artists, has produced a vital and thought-provoking edition with *The Stomach and the Port*, addressing some of the big questions of our times and overcoming significant challenges which the pandemic has presented along the way".

Manuela Moscoso, Curator of Liverpool Biennial 2021, said: "*The Stomach and the Port* reflects on systems of exchange, how borders are not only geographic but also political and subjective constructs. Rooted in decolonising our experience of the world, the artists collaboratively present a re-calibration of the senses and a catalyst for change."

Running alongside Liverpool Biennial's 2021 programme, exhibitions at partner venues will include: the UK's biggest painting competition, the John Moores Painting Prize, at the Walker Art Gallery; the retrospective of acclaimed photographer Don McCullin, together with Aliza Nisenbaum's paintings of Merseyside's NHS Frontline workers at Tate Liverpool; *Soft Boys*, the solo presentation of the Liverpool-based artist Kiara Mohamed at FACT; and *Al: More Than Human* at the World Museum. In addition, 18 local, regional and national artists will be represented by the Independents Biennial, delivered by Art in Liverpool.

Curatorial Study Group

This Curatorial Study Group will digest different perspectives and practices to aid the production, absorption and transformation of ideas - supporting our collective gut intelligence in response to the Biennial. A working group of 15-20 early-career curators, educators and other practitioners will be formed through an open call and invited to participate in 2 online gatherings with Curator Manuela Moscoso and guest speakers: Anthropologist Pedro de Niemeyer Cesarino and Curator Keyna Eleison. Each session will last between 2-3 hours. Participants will be invited to engage with one form of reading material for each session and encouraged to digest freely the content offered on the Biennial Online Portal.

Tuesday 1 June, 3-6pm: Pedro de Niemeyer Cesarino and Manuela Moscoso

Pedro de Niemeyer Cesarino will lead a discussion on the contemporary crisis of global capitalism through an anthropological perspective. Theoretical perspectives of Western scholars such as Anna Tsing, Donna Haraway and Marilyn Strathern will be connected to reflections developed by American native intellectuals on shamanism, exchange and kinship, offering potential alternatives to the understanding of the body and its relations. The discussions will be based on the text "Kinship and the Collapse of Civilisation: Bodies and Skins from the Forest", produced by Pedro Cesarino for *The Stomach and the Port* and available to read online.

Tuesday 8 June, 3-6pm: Keyna Eleison and Manuela Moscoso

How do we think of a Curator's book? How do we create a Biennial? How do we think from within practice? How do we work with the choices that artists have made? How do we make a vulnerable book? How do we assume the error? How do we stop compartmentalising?

These are some of the questions that Moscoso and Eleison asked while producing the curatorial reader as a catalogue for this Biennial edition. The workshop will focus on curatorial methodologies, processes of production and the exhibition format in an expanded form.

The Liquid Club

Haroon Mirza: The Three /W's live performance

For the Live Weekend join in the observance of Haroon Mirza's newly commissioned choral work *The Three /W's* (2021) which explores social gatherings and ritual, informed by the Fibonacci sequence and golden ratio. In collaboration with Mirza, Liverpool based choir leader Jenifer John leads an ensemble of performers, made up of Anne Taft, Emma Bispham, Jennifer John, Steve Boyland and Tayo Aluko to evolve the vocal interpretations of the ritual.

Ligia Lewis at Toxteth Reservoir

Ligia Lewis presents a newly commissioned choreographed performance at Toxteth Reservoir. Incorporating elements of interdependence, disorder and play, Lewis disrupts institutionalised ways of understanding, offering embodied knowledge as another way to sense and be in the world. Lewis' performance is site-specific, using the distinctive and cavernous infrastructure of Toxteth Reservoir as a site for an intimate encounter with narratives, both found and fabricated. Lewis builds a piece against the grain of colonial time and its legacies, bringing the subtle manoeuvrings of walking through a dreamscape where the haunting echoes of the past permeate each step.

Manuela Moscoso (b.1978, Ecuador) joined the Biennial from Tamayo Museo in Mexico City, where she was the Senior Curator. She is part of Zarigüeya, a programme that activates relations between contemporary art and the pre-Columbian collection of the Museo de Arte Precolombino Casa del Alabado, Ecuador. Moscoso was the adjunct curator of the 12th Cuenca Biennial and the co-curator of the Queens International 2011 biennial. In 2012 she was appointed co-director of Capacete, a residency programme based in Brazil where she also co-ran the curatorial programme Typewriter. Moscoso has collaborated with CA2M, Di Tella, MAM Medellin, Museo de Rio, RedCat and Fundac.
